Please mark your calendars for September 21st and our general meeting at The Point.



Wild and Scenic North Fork Sprague River

Where to fish dry flies without crowds in a cold, clear, freestone river in mid-July? Try the first dozen miles of Sprague's North Fork, the National Wild and Scenic part. This wraps east to west over the North Point of Gearhart Mountain Wilderness, a 22,809 acre public "arrowhead" about 20 miles northeast of Bly, Oregon on Hiway 140. 8,364-foot high Gearhart Mtn. provides important snow and spring feed west to Klamath River via the Sprague River and to east to Chewaucan River. We fished each river and everybody caught fish.


We rendezvoused at Bly Ranger Station at 10am and were comfortably setting up camp at Sandhill Crossing by noon. Richard Thomas and Gary Graham headed up-stream into the Wild and Scenic section and John Ward went down-stream right away to test the water. Everybody caught fish! A fine dinner of shrimp and scallops over pasta brought the day to a delightful close.

The last time I saw him, he showed me his schedule. He was only going to work 2 days a week. He asked me to call him when I got back from Alaska, so we could start fishing more...... I guess I will have to wait until I get to the other side.

September Outing--North Umpqua Steelhead

The North Umpqua is one of the most beautiful rivers in our area, and its steelhead tend to be larger and more challenging than those on the Rogue. The river has a long history of fly fishing, and there is a strong tradition for swinging flies. It is truly one of the great rivers for fly anglers with a passion for steelhead.

Our outing will take place Saturday and Sunday, September 10 and 11. We will meet in the Susan Creek Day Use Area (on the south side of the highway about a mile downstream of the campground) at 10:00 AM. We will start off with a discussion about the basic techniques, equipment, flies, and appropriate times and places to swing flies for steelhead. Then we will tour the lower section of the fly water to identify places to fish. If anyone is interested, we can work on basic Spey casting as well. During the summer, the best fishing will be in the evenings and mornings, so we will maximize our efforts during those periods.

Bring your 7 or 8-weight Spey rod, switch rod, and/or single-handed rod, a floating line, leaders with 2X or 3X tippets, and some traditional steelhead patterns. Flies like the Skunk, Purple Peril, or Umpqua Special in sizes 4 to 6 would be good choices. The North Umpqua can be difficult to wade, so bring your waders, wading boots with good traction, a wading belt, and a wading staff. An inflatable PFD would add an extra level of safety. Be sure to pack your polarized glasses, sun screen, food, water, and the rest of your normal fishing accessories.

For those that plan to camp, Susan Creek Campground is nice and has the most amenities. There are also several Forest Service campgrounds scattered along the river. If you prefer a motel, the Dogwood Motel (dogwoodmotel.com, 541-496-3403) near the lower end of the fly water is a good place to stay for those on a budget. If you're on a more generous budget, the Steamboat Inn (thesteamboatinn.com, 800-840-8825) is a great place to stay, and it overlooks some of the best water on the river. There are also numerous lodging and dining options in Roseburg.

Although the Rogue provides fly fishers with plenty of great opportunities for summer steelhead, the North Umpqua offers a nice change of pace. With its beautiful scenery, clear water, and big fish, it is certainly a river worth visiting.

That said, we are planning the Umpqua Valley Festival scheduled for September 10, 2016. We would like to invite you to be a guest tyer at our 8th Annual Fall Festival at the Glide Community Center on the North Umpqua Highway. Many of you have participated in the past; we appreciate your support, and want to continue the tradition but there is always room for new faces and ideas. We hope those of you who have not been able come or who did not know about our festival will be able to join us for a couple of days. Our festival is for the tyers, a smaller more informal venue will give you the opportunity to relax and visit with friends.

We can set up Friday afternoon September 9th, or if you prefer on Saturday morning. Doors will be open at 7am for Coffee and, Breakfast Burritos plus give you time to visit with friends. Advertised time is 9am-4pm but we did have some early birds last year. Morning sessions will run from 9- noon, with afternoon sessions from 1-4:00 pm. Details are still in the works, but we will have a casting pond, some individual presentations, and vendors.

This event is open to the public, turn-out varies, but this is an opportunity to introduce folks to the art of tying, to encourage the beginner tyer in a relaxed atmosphere and help the more experienced tyers learn new techniques. In addition to hosting a day for the tyers we are using this as an opportunity to raise funds for member and public education, service projects like tying and casting clinics for Vets and youth groups. Throughout the day there will be raffle and silent auction items. Last year we had about 10 vendors- Fishing rods, flies, tying supplies, vintage equipment, art, jewelry, wood carvings, and other handmade items.

Cascade Christian Fly Fishing Class Dale Heath


