Steelheading on the upper Rogue is good. Bankies and drifters alike are reporting success, and some days are quite good. The outlook is for continuing success until the river rises owing to heavy seasonal rains, which might not be until early spring. However it is good to check the condition of the river before going out because it can rise quickly and become discolored temporarily with a downpour in the high country where tributaries begin.

Also, I had one good report from fishing Agate Lake. A nice 15 inch trout was mixed in with a number of crappie, making the day well worth the trip. Agate Lake and the ponds can turn on surprisingly quickly if the sun shines and temperatures rise.

# **Steelhead Tournament 2012**

Steelhead Tournament 2012 was a great success. Following breakfast at TouVelle State Park 6:30-8:00 Saturday morning October 6, 25 anglers in 13 boats were on the upper Rogue chasing the coveted and wily steelhead. Like, is there any better way to start a day than with a hot cup of coffee or chocolate and breakfast on the bank of the Rogue River, prepared by our own John Ward with his team of chefs and assistants, Ken Bonsi, Dick Chambers, Dave Haight, Jack and Jan Rowe, and Curt Schlosser? If you can think of one please let me know and we will get you on next year's committee. The river was in excellent shape, flowing at about 1200 c.f.s. at TouVelle and clear, and the weather cooperated as if following the wishes of our anglers and oarsmen. TouVelle Park was also our venue for a wonderful bratwurst barbecue dinner prepared under the supervision of our own Vice President Mike Masters and his competent crew, wife Pam and Tanya Haight, complete with never ending beverages and camaraderie for everyone, thanks in part to Will Johnson (Ashland Fly Shop) for the keg!

All anglers were winners this year. Each contestant received a fly box embossed, "RFF Steelhead Tournament 2012," and containing a dozen proven steelhead flies tied by some of our better tiers including Dave Roberts, Dan Kellogg, Dick Bonamarte, and Otis Swisher, among others. Steelhead action was modest, with six steelies reported landed by day's end. The prize for largest fish was went to Jon Iverson who reported one measuring 26 inches. Jeff Keyser caught two steelhead and took home the prize for most fish landed. Jeff also reported one of his to be 26 inches (same as Jon Iverson), but it was ruled that only one prize was to be awarded to any one angler. Both Jon and Jeff won a rod custom built by Bob Claypool according to their specifications. Incidentally, a rumor making the rounds says that one of the two winners also lost a rod that day, so we are pleased that he at least broke even in that department.

While those of us involved with planning and executing the tournament were pleased with the result, we are interested in learning what the participants think. In addition to the views of anglers, we are also interested in hearing from the thirteen oarsmen almost half of whom are professional guides who gave up the opportunity for taking paying clients that day. Please remember these names if you need a guide on the middle or upper Rogue, or upper Klamath River, listed below. The non-professional oarsmen at the least surrendered the opportunity for a day of fishing themselves in order to participate in the tournament. We are deeply and sincerely grateful for your participation, anglers and oarsmen alike. Your comments will help to improve next year's tournament. Our next outing will be the New Years Day chili feed at the Holy Water. This annual event for the Rogue Flyfishers and Southern Oregon Fly Fishers began as a celebration of the fly fishing only rule for the Holy Water over 20 years ago, and has become one of our clubs strongest traditions

We will meet at the picnic shelter near the parking lot on the south side of the Holy Water. The fire should be going by 10 AM, and the chili will be served about noon. There will be opportunities to fish both before and after we eat.

It's difficult to predict what the weather and river flow will be like come January 1, but if conditions are favorable, we should enjoy some good fishing. Stripping or drifting small marabou leeches, woolly buggers, or nymphs along the bottom can be productive during the colder months. If the weather and flows cooperate, we could have a blue-winged olive or midge hatch. If you are going to fish, remember to get your **2013 fishing license**.

We need a few volunteers to make pots of chili, and a person or two to bring some fire wood. If you can help with either of these items, please contact David Haight. Others can help out by bringing cornbread, salads, desserts, or other items to share. The clubs will provide hot drinks and table service.

#### **PATTERN OF THE MONTH – Paint Brush**

Daiichi 2161, Curved shank salmon/steelhead, 1-6. Hook:

Thread: 6-0 red.

Body: Wide gold flat tinsel

Body Hackle: Red-orange hackle palmered over tinsel.

Purple, veiled by turquoise blue. Hackle:



# **Tying Instructions**

Step 1: Mash the barb, mount the hook in the vise, start the thread behind the hook eye, and lay down a smooth thread base to a point just above the hook point.

Step 2: Select a hot orange hackle feather with barbs at the tip end a bit longer than the hook gape. Prepare the feather and tie in by the tip, just above the hook point, with the shiny side facing you. The tip of the feather should be pointed toward the hook eye and the rest hanging over the back of the hook.

Step 3: Advance the thread in smooth spiral wraps forward to the starting point. Tie in the flat tinsel making sure that when you start your turns, the gold side is up. Wrap the tinsel in touching turns rearward to the end of the thread base, then reverse directions and wrap forward to the tie in point. Tie off and clip the excess.

Step 4 Lift the hot orange feather and fold the barbs to the rear. Wrap the hackle forward over the tinsel body in 5 equally spaced spiral turns to the front of the body. Tie off and clip the excess.

Step 5: Select a purple hackle feather with barb a bit longer than the body hackle. Prepare and tie in by the tip, shiny side facing you, fold the barbs rearward and take two turn while stroking the barbs rearward on each half turn. Tie off and trim excess.

Step 6: Select a blue hackle feather with barbs a bit shorter than the purple feather. Tie in and wind two turns using the same method as step 5. Tie off and trim.

Step 7: Tie back slightly on the blue and purple hackle forcing the rearward at a slight angle. Form a neat tapered thread head, whip finish and cement.

The Paint Brush is one of Bill McMillan's signature flies along with his Winter's Hope and the Steelhead Caddis. The fly was developed in 1973 and has proven itself as a very productive Winter Steelhead pattern. It's an elegant creation using only two materials, tinsel and hackle. In his words McMillan says "I always prefer simple patterns that use a minimum of materials because: 1) they sink better: 2) I am a very slow tier; 3) I don't like to pretend that a fish is more complicated that the rather primitive animal it is; and 4) intricate fly patterns are for t he human mind, not the fish's." Its basic shape is reminiscent of Stewart's Spiders and old time wet flies. The Paint Bruch is tied with the hackles gradually tapering longer toward the hook eye, and uses hackles that are soft and very webby. It is best dressed on heavier irons and fished using a floating line and strictly on a deep natural drift. McMillan named the fly for its resemblance to the Indian Paintbrush mountain flower.

Bill Mcmillan believes that being a celebrated fly fisherman is his life's work. He is not only a great and innovative steelhead angler, but has created flies that are an important part of Northwest steelheading tradition. He has also written a classic fly fishing book and is one of the sport's most passionate and articulate advocates for wild fish. In recent years, Bill's work has been focused on ensuring the survival of wild steelhead and other native Pacific Northwest fish.

## A Final Note

This will be my last installment to the "On The Fly" newsletter column. I have greatly enjoyed writing about the numerous fly patterns and techniques that I find interesting, and hope that these monthly mini-classes over the last 8 years have inspired a continued interest in the unending lessons to be learned about fly tying. My friend, Dave Roberts has agreed to continue the column. He's a great writer and a "bottomless pit" of fly tying lore and knowledge. So tie some up, give them a test flight and let me know how you do.
