LOOKING FORWARD

My initial speak to myself talk went something like, "Yea right! I'm not opposed to steering this ship but I'm not running it by myself?" After some thought, I decided to ignore the obvious, be hopeful for the needed help, and focus on LOOKING FORWARD.

In anticipation of potential future events, I thought I should attempt to author a President's Message with an emphasis on a personal mission. Please bear in mind that I'm really good at certain things. I've never thought writing was one of them. And besides, someone else might draw the short straw and in that case, this will never make it to print!

I digress. LOOKING FORWARD caused me to reflect back to those people, things and experiences that kept me in pursuit of fishing and fishing responsibly. What was it that propelled me forward to today?

One of my earliest memories of fishing was with my Father's Father. We went on a daytrip to Lake Hemet. Granddad was a stoic man of few words and when he spoke, you were expected to listen. I was likely five or six years old at the time. The boat was launched in the early light of dawn and we motored off. We soon slowed and anchored. Then to my amusement, Granddad opened several cans of corn and hurriedly flung the contents in every direction around the boat and then hid the cans in the paper sack from which they came. This corn tossing activity was followed shortly thereafter by a stern admonishment directed at me. Granddad stated "Don't ever let me catch you doing that!" I don't recall if we caught any fish but I never was much inclined to chum.

This experience and a host of others, combined with some good luck and my belief that God watches over idiots and children, allowed me to progress alive into my later years.

I was very fortunate through my childhood and adolescence. My family fished, a lot, and my best friend (whom I'll refer to as Goofy) and his family, fished a lot. Goofy and I fished at lakes, rivers, streams, gravel pits, the ocean, anywhere there was water. We were good fishermen and fairly well seasoned boatmen at an early age. The thought of turning two, ten year old kids loose on Lake Mojave, (Colorado River) in a twelve foot Starcraft boat with a 9.9 Johnson and told to be back by dark was trusting. Thirty mile round trips were routine. We caught a lot of fish but later wondered if our parents actually loved us all that much? If the truth were known, it's amazing we lived to talk about it. We've been best friends ever since.

Fly fishing began in our teens. The internet, Youtube and fish finders weren't even part of the equation. Trial and error, improvisation, paying attention and hanging out with people who knew what they were doing was the ticket to success. We were motivated young fishermen.

People have often asked me why young people are so hard to recruit into the Club. I'm not certain. It's likely many reasons. But I do know, that in this electronic age, information is only a keystroke away. Much can be learned by one who is resourceful. Kids, more likely young adults, might not think we have much to offer. I think there's nothing further from the truth.

Respect for the planet and passion for what we do, is not available on the internet. Experience and nuance, fellowship and effort create this passion. This is where we come in.

Those of us who actively participate in this adventure we call fly fishing, have learned that it's not just about catching the fish. It's about the people, the experience, the relationships, our lakes and rivers and the planet as a whole. Those folks that I know who are passionate about fly fishing, are some of the best advocates for the earth and the human race. I am grateful and blessed for the gifts that have been bestowed upon me as a result of fishing. This journey has been wonderful and I'm hoping it will continue for years to come.

RAMBLINGS OF A FLY TIER

BLUE WING OLIVE, SOFT HACKLE



Hook – Daiichi 1530, Daiichi 1480 or your favorite brand of hook in size 16 – 22

Thread – Veevus size 8 -10 or 16 or your favorite thread in a light olive (most of the time I use silk, just call me 'old school')

Tail – A few hackle barbs from a dun hen hackle

Body – A very sparse thin dubbed olive to match body color of BWO

Thorax – a small ball of olive dubbing

Wing – Medallion sheeting, clear scud back

Hackle – Dun hen or Valley quail

Note #1 – Most baetis have rusty or brown eyes so when you finish the head, if you feel it's important, switch thread colors at the head, or cheat, like me. I use a light brown permanent marker to color the 2-3in of thread I use to finish the head and whip finish.

Note #2 – If you prefer a light wire hook use a Mustad 94845, 94859 or a Tiemco 101. For a fly that floats in or on the surface film, I like a straight eye or up eye hook. It keeps the gape open on small hooks. I haven't seen it make that much difference on subsurface patterns.

The fly for this month is a BWO soft hackle emerger/stillborn. Why two names? Same fly tied on two different weight hooks. The heavier hook, Daiichi 1530, is to get the fly below the surface of the water and emerge to the top. The lighter hook, Daiichi 1480 allows the fly to stay in the surface film or on top to represent a cripple or still born.

The soft hackle/spider style of fly has been around since at least the 13th century. There are thousands of patterns from Ireland, Scotland, England and the United States.

WE ARE ALL INVITED TO A FREE INTRODUCTORY SPEY CLASS!!!

John Macdiarmid is holding an introductory spey class on Sat. Jan. 5 at 10:00a.m. He says:

In this introductory session we will talk about spey equipment and when to use what. How to fish with a spey rod will also be discussed. Then we will discuss spey books, DVDs and internet sites. I'll try to have some handouts but you may want to bring pen and paper for note taking.

Remember also Will Johnson of the Ashland Fly Shop has free spey lessons at the picnic area of the TouVelle State Park every third Sunday of the month at 9:00a.m. Will has generously done this for several years now and I encourage you to attend. He often has a few extra rods he can lend you for the class.

It is my hope that this group will consist of not just beginners but accomplished spey casters as well. Experienced casters will be encouraged to chime in and share there experiences with the class.

We have 4 club spey rods and will be glad to lend them to folks that have some experience and are ready to practice spey casting. It can be difficult to get out in the winter time but I find 30 mins. about right for a casting practice session. Most of us can tolerate the cold for a short period. I often practice at boat ramps with just knee boots, it is easy to wade out a short distance and there is no brush behind you.

Standing knee deep in a river methodically swinging the rod, fishing the swinging fly, stepping down to repeat the cast and swing is the most soothing, enjoyable activity I know. You are so in tune with the moving water and the natural surroundings, you become a participant with nature, not just an observer. I look forward to sharing the passion.

The gathering place will be the Madrone Hill Mobile Home Park at 8401 Old Stage Road. To get there from Medford take I-5 N and exit at exit 40. Turn left back over the freeway and continue on the Old Stage Road south towards Jacksonville. The park has a stone entrance on the right just before the road crosses Kane Ck. and begins to climb the hill. There is a fountain in the front yard.

January Outing: Winter Steelhead on the Oregon Coast

The Rogue Flyfishers will head to the Southern Oregon Coast for our January outing to fish for winter steelhead. January is a great time to head to the coast. While it is often cold and foggy here in the valley and the steelhead fishing in the upper Rogue is slow, the weather at the coast can be beautiful, and the winter steelhead fishery is in full swing.

The outing is scheduled for January 26 and 27. Due to the uncertainty of conditions on the coast during the winter, we will decide which streams to fish when we get closer to the date of the outing. The dates could even change if we get a storm that blows out all the streams. Consequently, anyone interested in attending the outing should send me (David Haight) an email or leave a phone message, and I will send out detailed information once a decision is made. I will provide equipment recommendations at that time as well.

We plan to fish streams in the vicinity of Gold Beach. Gold Beach has a good variety of lodging and dining, and there are several RV parks and campgrounds in the area. You can find more information at www.goldbeach.org.

The Southern Oregon Coast offers a variety of fishing opportunities from nymphing pockets in small streams to swinging flies through long runs on the big river. Plus, the steelhead are big and chrome bright, with a lot of energy. This should make for a fun outing.


