From Where I Sit As Oarsman

(Or, Where Are The Most Hookups) By Otis D. Swisher

When I am on the oars, I have a front row seat to all the action provided by the fisher in the front of the boat. But, depending on how big the fisher is my view is blocked. It reminds me of the problem the architects faced in Warsaw after WWII. They designed their replacement stadium for the one destroyed, without support columns, so that each spectator would have an unimpeded view. With the first athletic event they found to their chagrin, that with the exception of those sitting in the front-row seats, every other person was sitting behind a Pole.

Additionally, if the fisher up front is like my friend, Vince Zauskey, he is ambidextrous. His casting strokes cover the water on both sides of the boat equally well. This makes for a big blind spot upstream and behind me. (This is the usual start of any drift when using indicators.) So, what of the rest of the waters?

In going over my mental memories, not having kept a log of such things, I must rely on my perfect memory to be properly advised as to just where the most "hook ups" have taken place in the drift for those using indicators.

Only a very few hook ups took place up river behind me and out of my "cone of vision", even when my head was swiveled awkwardly. Still three of these stand out because we were in a swift run each time, and the big fish in each instance just kept going UP as we sped DOWN. I missed seeing anything, but I did hear the loud SNAP of the leader as it parted.

Some hook ups took place directly opposite us. These would be called 3:00 o'clock (right), or 9:00 o'clock (left), and so easy to see. But most were below the point of the boat, and therefore hidden behind Vince's body. So, my one and only opening was as you might visualize, a very small one, RIGHT UNDER VINCE'S ELBOW.

The above situation does not apply, of course, if the fisher is "swinging the fly", or "twitching the fly straight downstream", or you are moving the boat from one side of the river to the other so as to cover all the water. Then smashing take-downs are open for all to see under those circumstances.

But, when the body of the fisher in the front of the boat leaves you, the rower, with that out-and-down-blind spot, just do as I do: Look under Vince's elbow for those hook-ups.

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
